# Safe Sanctuary Guidelines

- Youth must serve in a room with at least two Safe Sanctuary trained adults.
- Youth should never be alone with children and may not walk children to get water, to the bathroom, etc.
- We ask that youth not use their phones, unless communicating with their parents or in case of an emergency.
- Please wear a name tag while volunteering. If you do not have one, you may make one or ask a staff member to provide one for you.
- Youth can set a wonderful example of behavior for younger children. You do not need to worry about the discipline of the children; this job belongs to the adults in the room.
- Youth must provide a Medical Release Form if their parents are not on site.
- Please do not take pictures or videos of any children while at FFUMC or a FFUMC event.
- Youth may not pick up or carry children.



### How can youth help?

- Shepherd in a Sunday School class (Preschool-4th grade)
- Vacation Bible School assistant in a rotation room or as a shepherd
- Best Buddy for a Special Needs Child
- Event staff—face painting, games, etc.
- Youth must be at least 5 years older than the class in which they are volunteering and may not help in the nursery.
